The Social Justice Studies (SJS) minor provides students with opportunities to develop **knowledge, framework, and skills** necessary to participate in the building of a just society. By introducing students to diverse social justice issues through the lens of multiple disciplinary perspectives and by providing opportunities for experiential learning, the SJS minor will help students become **active contributors to positive social change.**

Minor Requirements

The SJS minor is available to students in any major; however, at least three courses in this minor must be unique to the minor and not be used to satisfy the requirements of any other major or minor.

The minor consists of **5 courses** (20 credits total) that must be taken from at least three different disciplines (course prefixes):

At least one course from the Core Courses group

Four electives (more than 50 options!) - two 2-credit courses or a credit-bearing internship or independent study may be substituted for one of the elective courses, with program coordinator's approval

Experiential learning requirement, which could be satisfied by an independent study, internship, research project, or course with a substantial experiential component, with prior approval from the program coordinator.

Core Courses include Moral Philosophy, Social and Political Philosophy, Theories of Justice, Global Ethics, Religion and Social Justice.

Elective Courses from over a dozen disciplines, such as:

- Dispute Resolution, Environmental Conflict Management, Human Trafficking (Conflict & Resolution Studies)
- Economics of Poverty & Discrimination (Economics)
- African American Literature, Gender and Sexuality in Literature (English)
- Global Environmental Issues (Environmental Studies)
- Theories of Gender (Gender & Women's Studies)
- The Underground Railroad in History and Culture, Latin American History (History)
- Foundations in Latin American Studies (Latin American Studies)
- Bioethics, Human Rights in Theory and Practice (Philosophy)
- World Politics (Political Science)
- Public Policy (Public Policy)
- Religion and the Environment (Religious Studies)
- Race & Ethnicity, Criminology, Juvenile Justice, Sociology of Wealth & Power (Sociology)
- Narconovelas: Migracion y Exilio, Voices for Change: Latin American & Latinx Artivism (Spanish)
